THE PRESIDENT

DR. MILDRED GARCÍA

On May 2, 2008, California State University, Dominguez Hills celebrates the inauguration of Mildred García as its seventh president. “Transforming Lives: Our Heritage, Our Future.” is the chosen theme for the inauguration and commemorates the proud history of the University while looking forward to a bright and exciting future under the leadership of President García.



Dr. García assumed the presidency on August 1, 2007, and in doing so became the University’s first female president and the first Latina president in the 23-campus California State University system. With a strong commitment to academic excellence and multicultural alliances, and with more than three decades of teaching and administrative experience, President García is a good fit for a university that is one of the most ethnically and culturally diverse in the western United States.

García came to CSU Dominguez Hills after serving from 2001 to 2007 as president of Berkeley College, a private institution with seven campuses located in New York and New Jersey. Under her leadership, the college began offering full academic programs in an online format and approved over 14 new bachelor’s and 14 associate’s degrees. The college also made a number of capital improvements during her tenure, including the construction of new facilities.

Prior to Berkeley, she was at Arizona State University (1997–2001), holding a variety of positions there, including Vice Provost for Academic Personnel, Associate Vice Provost for Academic Affairs, Associate Director of the Hispanic Research Center at Arizona State University, and Tenured Professor in the Social and Behavioral Sciences

Department. From 1986 to 1996 she was at Montclair State University, starting out as Executive Assistant to the Vice President of Academic Affairs before joining the faculty in the School of Professional Studies and serving as Assistant Vice President of Academic Affairs (1988–1996). She has also held the post of Dean of Students at Hostos Community College of City University of New York (1979–1986).

An educator foremost, President García continues to conduct research that concentrates on equity in higher education and its impact on policy and practice. She has written extensively and is a much sought-after speaker at national and international conferences. President García is an active member of the American Council of Education where she serves on its Board of Directors. She also serves on the Editorial Advisory Board of *Peer Review*; on the board of the Association of American Colleges and Universities; on the Advisory Board for *Hispanic Outlook in Higher Education*; and as founding board member of the National Council for Community and Education Partnerships.

President García received a Doctor of Education as well as an M.A. in higher education administration from Teachers College, Columbia University; an M.A. in business education/ higher education from New York University; a B.S. in business education from Bernard Baruch College of City University of New York (CUNY); and an A.A.S. in legal secretarial sciences in business from New York City Community College of CUNY.

EVELYN HU-DEHART

Professor of History and Ethnic Studies

Director, Center for the Study of Race and Ethnicity in America

Brown University



Evelyn Hu-DeHart was born in China and immigrated to the United States with her parents when she was 12. She often describes herself as a multicultural person who speaks several languages (including English, French, Spanish, Portuguese, German, and her native Chinese) and moves easily among several cultures. Her professional life has focused on what Cuban historian Juan Perez de la Riva calls “*la historia de la gente sin historia*” (the history of people without a history).

Dr. Hu-DeHart is Professor of History and Director of the Center for the Study of Race and Ethnicity in America at Brown University. She joined Brown from the University of Colorado at Boulder where she was Chair of the Department of Ethnic Studies and Director of the Center for Studies of Ethnicity and Race in America. She has also taught at the City University of New York system, New York University, Washington University in St. Louis, University of Arizona and University of Michigan, as well as lectured at universities and research institutes in Mexico, Peru, Cuba, France, Hong Kong, Taiwan and China.

Hu-DeHart is an internationally recognized scholar and winner of numerous honors and awards, including two Fulbright grants (to Brazil and Peru) and a three-year Kellogg National Leadership Award. She is the author of three books on the Yaqui Indians of northern Mexico and Arizona and numerous articles on Asian American and Native American history. Her current research interest is on the Asian diaspora in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Hu-DeHart’s professional activities include many lectures and consultancies on issues of diversity and multiculturalism, including Latin American and Caribbean history; Asian American history and the Asian diaspora; race, ethnic, and gender relations and issues; multicultural education and the politics of multiculturalism; ethnic studies and curriculum reform; and refugee and immigration issues.

Hu-DeHart has testified before the U.S Commission on Civil Rights, served as a panelist on national teleconferences about race and higher education, and appeared on the McNeil-Lehrer Newshour, among other television and radio programs. She is a founder of the Asian Pacific American Women’s Leadership Institute.

A graduate of Stanford University (B.A., political science with honors, 1968), Hu-DeHart earned her Ph.D. in history at the University of Texas–Austin in 1976, specializing in the history of Latin America, and a Doctor of Laws from the University of Notre Dame in 2003.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

The colorful attire worn by the delegates has been an integral feature of American academic pageantry since the end of the nineteenth century. The tradition of wearing the academic gowns, the mortarboard caps, tassels and hoods and the carrying of the mace originated in Europe during the Middle Ages. The gown is held to be an adaptation of the robe of the friar or priest; the hood, the monk's cowl; and the mortarboard cap recalls the skull cap. The presidential installation ceremony maintains much of the tradition and pageantry of the early times.

ATTIRE

For each of the degree levels, bachelor's, master's and doctoral, the gown sleeves indicate the degree held by the wearer. The bachelor's gown is a yoked, closed-front garment with long, pointed sleeves. The master's can be worn open or closed and has long sleeves, usually closed but slit above the elbow. The doctoral gown has full, bell-shaped sleeves and is trimmed with velvet panels down the front and has velvet bars on each sleeve. The color of the panels and bars is often varied to indicate the academic discipline in which the doctoral degree was earned. The length and shape of the hood also indicate the highest degree earned by the wearer. The color of the velvet border on any hood indicates the wearer's field of study.

THE MACE

The University Mace is a ceremonial symbol of authority carried in academic processions during commencement and convocations at universities and colleges. The honor of serving as Bearer of the Mace at California State University, Dominguez Hills is accorded to the Chair of the Academic Senate, the governing body of the faculty.

THE PRESIDENTIAL CHAIN

The University Seal forms the centerpiece of the ceremonial chain that is worn by the presidents of the University. Nine gold medallions represent the tenure of seven presidents and two interim presidents. The medallions form a chain and symbolize the continuity of the university's traditions. The medallion of the seventh and current president, Mildred Garcia, is linked to the Seal. The name and years of service for each president are indicated on each medallion. The ceremonial chain was first presented in 1999 to Herbert Carter at the annual Commencement Exercises.

HISTORY OF CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, DOMINGUEZ HILLS

California State University, Dominguez Hills is located on a portion of the historic Rancho San Pedro, the oldest Spanish land grant in the Los Angeles area. Its 346-acre campus was in the continuous possession of the Dominguez family through seven generations, from its concession to Juan Jose Dominguez in 1784 to its acquisition by the people of the state of California for the home of the University.

The California State Legislature authorized the establishment of the University in 1960 and the bill became law when Governor Edmund G. (Pat) Brown signed it on April 29, 1960. At that time, the college was to be known as South Bay State College. On January 19, 1962, its first president, Dr. Leo F. Cain, was appointed. He proceeded to assemble a planning staff whose priority was the selection of a site for the college.

Temporarily located in a California Federal Savings Bank in Palos Verdes in 1965, the university held its first classes in the fall of 1965. On October 14, 1965, the board approved purchase of the Dominguez Hills site, but it was not until March 3, 1966, that the Board of Trustees changed the name of the institution to California State College, Dominguez Hills.

In September 1966, CSC Dominguez Hills opened its doors at another temporary location, what was called the Watt campus in honor of Ray A. Watt, president of the Stevenson Village Company, which owned the land and agreed to construct a building for the University's use. The Watt campus was on Victoria Street across the street from the current site of the University.

On June 10, 1967, the college held its first commencement on the Watt campus with four graduates who had entered the Palos Verdes location as juniors.

After acquiring title to the Rancho land, the college held its official groundbreaking on December 5, 1967. The opening of the permanent campus occurred on October 14, 1968, in a complex still referred to today as the Small College Complex. The remainder of the initial buildings opened on January 2, 1969, followed by the Social and Behavioral Science Building in fall 1971, and the Educational Resources Center on January 15, 1972. Slightly more than a year later, on April 29, 1973, the college dedicated its new Natural Sciences and Mathematics building. In 1974–75, the Humanities and Fine Arts building, a Student Health Center, and a Theatre Arts Center opened.

Upon the announcement of President Cain's retirement, a search for a new president culminated in the appointment of Dr. Donald R. Gerth, who addressed the faculty for the first time on September 26, 1976.

On September 12, 1977, the California State University Board of Trustees voted to approve university status to the college, and the institution was renamed "California State University, Dominguez Hills."

CSU Dominguez Hills has benefited greatly from the service of the presidents and interim presidents who followed Presidents Cain and Gerth: Dr. Richard Butwell (1984–86); Dr. John Brownell (1986–89), interim; Dr. Robert C. Detweiler (1989–98); Dr. Herbert L. Carter (1998–99), interim; Dr. James E. Lyons, Sr. (1999–2007); Dr. Boice Bowman (2007), interim; and currently Dr. Mildred García (2007–present).

CSU Dominguez Hills has continued to broaden its ethnic and geographic base. It has become, as *U.S. News & World Report* has noted for several years, "one of the most diverse campuses in the West." The University provides a wide range of outstanding academic programs and opportunities to over 12,000 students annually, ensuring an exceptional and well-rounded educational experience. Our graduates leave with the skills that enable them to become leaders and productive citizens of a diverse and global society.
